

leave your gift there before the altar.





Emphasis on individual goals and individual rights





Identificational Repentance

Nehemiah 1: 5-7

"LORD, the God of heaven, the great and awesome God, who keeps his covenant of love with those who love him and keep his commandments, let your ear be attentive and your eyes open to hear the prayer your servant is praying before you day and night for your servants, the people of Israel.

I confess the sins we Israelites, including myself and my father's family, have committed against you.

We have acted very wickedly toward you. We have not obeyed the commands, decrees and laws you gave your servant Moses."



Identificational Repentance

- **Nehemiah**'s identificational repentance (Neh. 1:6-9) also paved the way for corporate repentance (8:9-11; 9:1-2)
- In Nehemiah 9:2, we're told that **the people of God** confessed their sins -- and the sins of their ancestors.
- Isaiah repented on behalf of all the Israelites (Isaiah 6:5)
- Jeremiah confessed the sins of his generation and his forefathers (Jer. 3:25; 14:7, 20)
- **Daniel'**s identificational repentance delivered God's people from the demonic principalities of Persia and Greece (Dan. 9:8, 20-22; 10:2ff.)









As white American Christians,
too often we have not listened to

As white American Christians, too often we have focused on a narrow range of injustices while actively ignoring others.



As white American Christians, too often we have chosen to listen only to those who reinforce our opinions and have dismissed our own brothers and sisters who have different perspectives.

We have sacrificed truth for the sake of reassuring ourselves that we are right.



As "woke" white American Christians, too often we have treated our white brothers and sisters in Christ – people who sincerely love Jesus – with arrogance because they are not as "far along" as we perceive ourselves to be.

We have othered them and have spoken of them with disdain. We have essentially said to them, "I have no need of you."
